
The Dairyland Tin Lizzies

One of the first projects in the service bay was installing a brake equalizer on Fritz's '26 Tudor. As with many of the improvements available for purchase these days, the equalizer kit has instructions that aren't 100% clear and require *some* interpretation. Likewise, the parts don't always fit perfectly and need some modifications. Eventually, the installation was complete with the equalizer functioning as expected.





In the next bay, Travis Schisel's '25 Roadster was getting attention. The issue was that it consistently ran poorly. The original thought was that it needed to have the magnets recharged. Getting down to business it was determined that what it really needed was to have the mag post cleaned. Then it was a matter of getting the timer to cooperate. After a cleaning and then a <u>lot</u> of time spent on *adjusting* the timing, Travis' Roadster was running like a top. The magnets were just fine.



Meanwhile, over on the bench, work was underway on troubleshooting suspect generators. As many of you know, the first and most basic test for generators is to hook it up to run it as a motor. If it runs as though it is a motor when connected to a 6v battery, it will most likely operate as a generator. Of course there still may be worn out components and one still needs to adjust the third brush once it is installed, but it *is* a great starting point. Adding the cut-out complicates things as it adds its own issues, but one thing at a time, please.



A delicious lunch featuring broasted chicken from Chissy's along with pasta salad, German potato salad and chips was offered up around noon. Of course there were dessert options as well. FRENCH TOAST CASSEROLE

I loaf of 12 oz. french bread cut into 1-inch slices (or you can use the Wonder Texas Toast and you do not need to do anything to it) 1 21oz. can apple pie filling

- 8 large eggs
- 2 cups milk 1 cup half & half
- 2 tsp. vanilla 1/2 tsp. nutmeg
- 1/2 tsp. cinnamon

- Topping: 1/2 cup softened butter (margarine does not work as well)
- 2 tsp. corn syrup (or maple syrup)

I cup chopped nuts (not pean uts)

Heavily butter 9X13 pan. Layer as follows: bread, apple pie filling, bread, set aside.

In blender, mix eggs, milk, half & half, vanilla, nutmeg and cinnamon. (If you don't have a blender, use a mixer.) Mix these ingredients well. Pour over base. Refrigerate overnight.

In the morning, put on topping, just before baking. Bake for 50 minutes at 350 degrees. Of course, you baking time may vary so check frequently so that it does not burn.


In Memoriam Howard Fischer - October 23, 1932 to May 9, 2024
